Introducing our Locum Priest

It is a lovely and precious experience for Dennis and I to be with you. We remember many of you from our years here from 1985 till early 1989. We moved here from Sydney with our three children as I began working as a Lay Parish Assistant – it was before women could become deacons, and much before they could become priests. I had been studying for quite a few years before that, firstly doing my BA in history and philosophy at Macquarie University, and then completing my Bachelor of Divinity degree at the University of Sydney. This was an academic degree and catered for people from many denominations.



Dennis worked as a Senior Technical Officer with Telstra (Telecom as it was then), and was fortunate to be able to get a transfer from Sydney up to the Newcastle area. Our three children, Alister, Heather and Kathy, then 14, 12 and 8, moved to schools up here.

The years we spent here were very precious to us, we loved the beautiful friendship, lovely church, and ministries we found here. Dennis and the three children were very happily involved with Kath Waddell in the church choir, whilst I was involved with liturgical duties. And the thriving Youth Fellowship of the time involved us all.

And what a great and vibrant parish you have here at St Peter's: beautiful worship, a great team of Clergy, Eucharistic assistants, servers, readers, intercessors, and outreach with Op-Shop, Emergency Relief, Community Meals, worship and activities to families and young people, Bible Studies and parish groups.

In the years since we have left, I have worked as assistant at St Augustine's Merewether, then at the Church of Transfiguration in Windale, first as Deacon in Charge, then (when priesting of women was passed by the General Synod in 1992), as Priest in Charge, then Rector as we gained parish status, Rector of Mt Vincent and then St John's, Raymond Terrace. Over some of that time I also served as Archdeacon of Maitland. Following my first (!) retirement, Archbishop Roger Herft offered me the position of Rector at St Paul's Mirrabooka, in the Archdiocese of Perth . And now, following my second retirement, Dennis and I are delighted to be able to share some time with you, renewing old friendships and making new ones!

During this time of waiting for the appointment of your new Rector, we will enjoy worshipping with you and the many opportunities for fellowship. And we will all continue to pray for those in the parish and diocese as they seek the new Rector for this wonderful parish.

We are also happy to provide group tours which can include an organ recital and refreshments (please contact the Parish Office in advance to arrange group bookings).



### Worship During the Period after Christmas Day each Year

The daily pattern of weekday services is temporarily suspended each year from after the final Eucharist on Christmas Day until the Sunday after 4th January each year.

During this period the Church remains open for individual prayer and reflection and there is a Vigil Eucharist on Saturday evenings at 6 pm and one Eucharist on Sunday morning at 8.30 am.







### Parish Mission Action Plan

- · Expanding our ministries amongst families.

We are seeking to resource this vision through a series of financial strategies and the continuing renewal and development of our buildings and site. Progress towards the Mission Action Plan is evaluated at each meeting of the Parish Council, and reported annually to the Annual General Meeting.

# A Safe Church



### Stained Glass Windows

The stained glass windows in our church building are extraordinarily beautiful, but they remain unfinished. The current yellow coloured glass high up in the clerestory windows was installed in the 1970s, where once it had been hoped that stained glass windows would be in place.

We are extremely fortunate to have secured the skilled expertise of Jeff Hamilton, who is working from his studio in Sydney to design and craft our new windows. The windows combine traditional designs with brilliant and inspiring colours.

Two groups of windows were installed in 2016 and a further two groups in 2017. It is hoped that further groups will be installed in 2018 and 2019 to complete the first phase of the project which aims to have stained glass windows installed in every window in the south of the clerestory. A focus of the initial phase has been to depict in the windows former churches of the parish which have been de-consecrated down through the years.

We invite you to join us in creating history and help us to complete the windows in this historic heritage building. Donors (individuals, groups or organisations) have the opportunity to choose the memorial or thanksgiving text that will be included in the window, and which will be in place for hundreds of years to come. 



## Mission Partnerships

We provide financial and regular prayer support for a number of mission partners to assist the work of God's mission both within and beyond the Parish.

Our principal mission partner for national and international support is the Anglican Board of



ABM's philosophy is based on a belief in holistic mission - that God calls us to serve people in all aspects of their lives, from the spiritual to the practical. This includes all the evangelistic activities of the church in its witness to the Gospel, such as ministry, theological education and training, and the development of Christian worship and liturgy resources. Mission also includes providing health and education services, helping people to build capacity to improve food and water resources, and assisting in economic development initiatives. In all of its work, ABM seeks to serve God through supporting its partners in their local witness and service.

Each year we aim to raise \$12,000 for our mission partners through:

- regular mission giving at Mass (through our giving envelopes or electronic giving);
- two mission lunches each year with special guest speakers (one focusing on mission in Australia and one focusing on mission overseas);
- coin collections at home using our mission pigs (you can collect a pig from the back of church).

The projects that we support aim to focus on three areas:

- Local including support for ministry in neighbouring parishes, resourcing scripture teaching in local primary schools, and assisting with the funding of scripture teachers in local secondary schools;
- National especially focusing on indigenous education and reconciliation through the Anglican Board of Mission;
- *International* supporting a project of the Anglican Church in another country through the Anglican Board of Mission.

Our Mission Giving Secretary Yvonne Hinde (contact details on the back page) will be able to give you details about the projects that we are supporting at the current time.

The Parish also supports the work of our Bishop and the Anglican Diocese of Newcastle. Our annual contribution to the Diocese is normally over \$25,000. In addition parishioners support a range of other charities, and some choose to support the work of the Bush Church Aid Society through their mission boxes scheme.

### Saint Peter's Emergency Relief

For over thirty years the Parish has offered emergency relief and assistance to thousands of people in need in the Hunter Region. Saint Peter's Emergency Relief has had a long supportive partnership with the Samaritans Foundation, and our programmes receive financial and management support from the Foundation.

Our services are available on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 am - 12 noon and 12.30 - 2.30 pm. We can provide access to financial counselling, emergency food supply, accommodation advice and other support services for those people in our community facing challenging times.

Food is collected each Sunday at our services and other contributions are received from neighbouring parishes. Financial donations from local clubs are used to supplement the donated food.

# Saint Peter's Church Memorial Garden A Sacred Space of Faith, Hope & Love







We offer to all members of our local community columbarium niches, interment of ashes in our beautiful memorial garden, and stained glass window memorials in our historic church, in the knowledge that they will be cared for in perpetuity.

The historic Church of Saint Peter's stands at the heart of East Maitland surrounded by gardens that form a constant oasis of beauty and tranquility. Our church building is open every day of the year for prayer and reflection, as are our gardens.

The mortal remains of many of our friends and loved ones rest in the columbarium niches and memorial garden. We invite all members of our local community to consider our columbarium or garden as the final resting place for their cremated remains, where family members and descendants will be able to come and visit in this sacred space which we will continue to care for in perpetuity.

We also offer a unique opportunity for stained glass windows to be permanently installed as memorials within our heritage Church building, and for memorial flowers to be placed in the Church on the anniversary of the death of a loved one or on other special days, with the assurance of our prayers for those who have died and for all who mourn.

## Holy Baptism

Saint John's Gospel tells us that at a meeting between Jesus and a leading Jew called Nicodemus, Jesus said that unless we are born from above we cannot see the kingdom of God. Naturally, Nicodemus was puzzled. He asked if a grown man or woman could really go back into the mother's womb and be born again.

The answer to that question is obvious. The mother goes through great pain to give birth to a baby. Nothing can put the baby back into the womb.

But what Jesus was really talking about is starting a new life with God, and baptism is a sign of this. Jesus went on to tell us that your baby isn't just your child. Your baby is also God's child. And He, too, went to enormous pains – even to dying on the cross for us – to show us how much He loves every child of His.



Jesus knew that such love has to be seen to be believed. And baptism is the sign, or Sacrament, that he gave us to show his love. Sometimes, people imagine that we have to be baptised to show our belief in God. In a sense, that's true. But baptism is far more that: it shows God's belief in us.

From very early in its history, the Church has baptised young children as a sign of God's love. Some of the oldest baptisteries contained a second, much smaller, font beside the main one. This was used by children who were too small to stand comfortably in the main font, which in those earliest days of the Church was a deep pool let into the floor.

Just as we need the love of our family to grow as a human being, so do we also need the love of our heavenly Father to grow as a child of God.

Baptising a child, before they can make the slightest effort to do anything for their own salvation, says very dramatically that all salvation is from God. Clearly, in the baptism of an adult there must already be an element of faith – some sign of accepting God's love. But a child is carried to the font by the faith of the family and the Church, and shows that God accepts us, without us having to do or achieve anything first.

We are delighted to welcome families who bring children for Holy Baptism (christening), and adults who wish to be baptised and confirmed. Except during the Season of Lent when there are no baptisms in church, we baptise during every week throughout the year.

Baptisms normally take place in our Saturday evening Vigil Mass at 6 pm, and on Sunday mornings in the Sung Mass at 9.30 am. Baptisms also take place in shorter services at 11.30 am and 12.30 pm, and at other times on Sunday and during the week.

The easiest way to book a baptism is to go to our website and complete the booking form. Once the baptism has been booked parents and god parents participate in a short 'Welcome to Baptism' session normally late on a Sunday afternoon.

Donations of items for the Op Shop can be brought to the Parish Office – we particularly need items of clothing, bric-a-brac, books, craft items and toys.





# At the End of Life

Following the death of a loved one many families turn to their Parish Church for support and to provide the venue for a funeral service. Everyone is welcome at Saint Peter's.

While it is easy to speak of the gift of life, it is harder to speak of death as a gift. To even think of death as a gift might seem strange. But if we believe that life is a gift, then it also makes

sense to recognise how the conclusion of our earthly life is just as significant as its beginning.



Our Christian faith teaches us that nothing can separate us from the love of God, and so when we think about our own dying we hold together both the mixed emotions of uncertainty about all that will change for us and for our families, and the hope that we will live with God in the eternal life of his love for ever with all those who have gone before us. In normal circumstances the family of the deceased makes initial contact with a Funeral Director and the Funeral Director then contacts the Parish Clergy. After this initial contact a member of the Parish Clergy will then be in touch with the family to arrange a pastoral visit and to discuss the funeral arrangements. Funerals can be held in Saint Peter's Church, at a crematorium or at the graveside. One of the Parish Clergy can conduct a service at any of these locations.

If the body of the deceased will be cremated, it is normal for the whole service to be held at either the church or the crematorium and not to have services at both locations. If the body of the deceased will be buried it is normal for the service to be held at either the church or the crematorium with a second shorter service following at the graveside. A Christian funeral service normally includes prayers, hymns and/or other music (this can include recorded music), one or more readings from the Bible, and one or more eulogies. The service can take place within the Holy Eucharist.

We provide a funeral customary for those who wish to prepare their funeral arrangements as an act of faith in God, and love for their families. One of our priests is able to assist in filling in the customary.

In early November each year we hold a Service of Thanksgiving and Remembrance and a Requiem Mass around All Souls' Day to remember and pray for our departed loved ones.

# Saint Peter's Church Memorial Flowers Remembering the Departed in Faith, Hope & Love



The historic Church of Saint Peter's stands at the heart of East Maitland as a place of faith, hope and love for the whole community. Our church building is open every day of the year for prayer and reflection.

Each year families remember loved ones who have died by dedicating memorial flowers in the church. The flowers are placed in the church for the weekend nearest to the anniversary of death and the loved one who is being remembered is named in our prayers at the weekend services.



# Expectations of Behaviour in the Saint Peter's Church Community

#### Communicating with each other:

- We will communicate respectfully with others, and not in a way that threatens, belittles or humiliates.
- We will speak with integrity and honesty, and refrain from speculation and gossip.

#### **Acknowledging difference:**

- We will respect those who are different from us and not isolate or ridicule them.
- We will listen to and seek to understand the beliefs, opinions and practices of others, even when we do not share their views.

#### Responding to conflict:

- We will accept responsibility for our part in a conflict.
- We will be willing to play our part in resolving a conflict.
