

A Message from Mother Beatrice Pate

My theme this month is music, so much part of our lives, and often taken for granted.

Firstly I would like to tell you a bit about the movie, Three Summers, written and directed by Ben Elton. Set in a fictional West Australian town inland from Bunbury, this romantic comedy tells a story that covers three annual Summer Music Festivals. It is a fantastic movie that deserves, I think, much more exposure than it had. It was better known in WA, true, but its warm, human themes embrace us all.



One of the joyous things about the movie is its celebration of different styles and types of music, and the way it can draw us together. In a time when it is hard to find positive, non-violent, family friendly movies here is one everyone can enjoy. I admit to feeling a sense of personal ownership of it because one of our dear parishioners in WA had a relative playing in one of the bands. So we had a theatre night and many from the St Paul's parish, where I served, came along and all enjoyed it.

Do make every effort to come along on Sunday 15th September, down in the Parish Hall, commencing at 4.00pm and let us enjoy it with our St Peter's friends as well. Afterwards there will be pizza to enjoy, and ice cream during the movie. Do make every effort to come along. Pay at the door!

My second item in my music theme emerges from last Sunday's reading. The end of the second reading, Hebrews 12.8:

Let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe.

We worship in a beautiful church, one that does inspire reverence and awe. So much of our modern life allows no room for reverence and awe – indeed it is counter cultural. As we prepare to come to church we ought to prayerfully put aside, as much as we are able, the stresses of our lives, quieten our minds, be still and open to the very presence of God.

One of the most precious ways we are helped as we come into the holy space of our lovely church is not just the breathtaking building, but also the stunning music we are offered. Those from the past have left us the stunning organ and the privilege of continuing the precious Anglican music traditions, in which generations of Christians have approached God.

We are blessed with Evanne Sherringham, our music director, Kath Waddell and Margot Miller who support Evanne and share playing for our services. The gifts they offer us are skills they have spent so many years learning and perfecting.

And then we have the support of those wonderful singers in the choir. Maybe you have musical talents – do not be shy and hide them, rather be prepared to share them for all our blessing! New singers are most enthusiastically welcomed into the church. Talk to Evanne.

We have so much to help us to approach God with reverence and awe.

But sometimes we take all this for granted. So let our hearts and imaginations go free. So free back to the wonder of childhood and to a children's book. I am thinking of the wonderful children's classic, Grahame Greene's Wind in the Willows, the timeless tale of Ratty and Mole. In one chapter they go out to seek to find the lost baby otter. They row up each branch of the river, right through the dark night, then as dawn appears:

Rat, who was in the stern of the boat, while Mole sculled, sat up suddenly and listened with a passionate intentness. Mole, who with gentle strokes was just keeping the boat moving while he scanned the banks with care, looked at him with curiosity. "It's gone!" sighed the Rat, sinking back in his seat again. "So beautiful and strange and new.

Since it was to end so soon, I almost wish I had never heard it. For it has roused a longing in me that is pain, and nothing seems worthwhile but just to hear that sound once more and go on listening to it for ever. No! There it is again!" he cried, alert once more. Entranced, he was silent for a long space, spell-bound. "Now it passes on and I begin to lose it," he said presently. "O Mole! The beauty of it! The merry bubble and joy, the thin, clear, happy call of the distant piping! Such music I never dreamed of, and the call in it is stronger even than the music is sweet! Row on, Mole, row! For the music and the call must be for us."



On they paddle, as dawn approaches, drawn ever on by the beautiful piping. Eventually, drawn to a tiny island, they go ashore and then, as the sun climbs over the horizon,

Perhaps Rat would never have dared to raise his eyes, but that, though the piping was now hushed, the call and the summons seemed still dominant and imperious. He might not refuse, were Death himself waiting to strike him instantly, once he had looked with mortal eye on things rightly kept hidden. Trembling, he obeyed, and raised his humble head; and then, in that utter clearness of the imminent dawn, while Nature, flushed with fullness of incredible colour, seemed to hold her breath for the event, he looked in the very eyes of the Friend and Helper

And there they find the baby otter safely curled up and asleep. Beautiful writing, but catching the awesome power of music, to draw us out of ourselves, open our hearts to the divine, to the Holy Spirit of God, to reverence and awe in our worship.

Yes, we have a wonderful heritage here, a heritage of music, we have a beautiful building richly endowed for us by Christians of past years, we have so many gifted people, both in music and in leading in the liturgy, in prayers, reading, serving. All moved by God to help us be more his people, strengthened by his grace and guidance.

Let us seek to live as his people, make his presence known, show forth the love that Jesus teaches, to make a difference in our community and in our world.

And make every effort to come along and enjoy the community in sharing a great movie in the Parish Hall on Sunday 15th September.



Site Maintenance Projects

There has been a flurry of activity around the church in recent weeks as a number of projects have been completed.

Saint Barnabas Aisle

The trip hazard sign has been a permanent fixture of the northern aisle for quite some time so it was exciting to see the truck arrive with a team of workers ready to remedy the issue, raise the level of the aisle, and make the aisle safe. The job went very smoothly, allowing the church to re-open on schedule.

Saint Barnabas Altar

The carpeting in front of the Saint Barnabas Altar has been replaced and the surrounding area renovated to make it more easily accessible.



LED Lighting for Church

Have you noticed a difference in the church lighting? All of the church lighting has been replaced with LED lighting, creating a more natural overall lighting throughout the church, and all lights are now the same colour.

Church Bell

The regular inspection of the Church Bell identified safety issues that resulted in removal of the bell for the short term. The problems will be rectified at such time that the church roof is replaced, which is one of the major projects currently under discussion.



The Rectory

The Housing Working Team, led by Site Maintenance Manager, David Burton, has been working on ensuring that the Rectory is bright and sparkling for the new incumbent and his family when they move in at the end of November. This includes a new bathroom, painting throughout, carpeting, and a general overhaul of minor maintenance issues.



Stormwater Drainage

A complete review of the Stormwater Drainage on site has been undertaken with the use of a flexible camera to determine any damage or blockages. Surprisingly, given the age of the pipes, overall the stormwater system was in good repair, with the exception of a small length of drainage at the entry to the driveway to the Parish Hall, that has now been replaced.

All of the above projects come at a cost but are a part of maintaining our beautiful church and properties into the future.

Parish Council Meetings

The Parish Council meets each month - including Church Wardens, Parish Councillors and members of the Ministry Team. Meetings cover a range of topics to ensure that all aspects of Parish life are considered and addressed in a timely fashion. Topics discussed at the August meeting included:

- Removal of the ramp to the northern door
- Renovation work in the Rectory prior to the arrival of the new Incumbent and his family.
- Replacement of Church Roof commencing the process
- Construction of a large storage shed on site.
- Possible funding opportunities to assist with costs of work.

Access Doors to Saint Peter's

Ramp to Northern Door

There has been much discussion in recent months about the ramp access to the northern door to the church. All construction at the church is required to comply with Office of Heritage requirements as well as the usual Council Development Application requirements.

Unfortunately there are issues regarding the safety of the ramp that were not identified until construction was completed. At that time a new Heritage Consultant was engaged who advised that the ramp does not comply with safety requirements. In order to comply we are required to remove the stairs on the northern side of the ramp, adjust the crossfall of the ramp which is non-compliant, and construct handrails and kerbrails on both sides of the ramp. These adjustments would be at considerable expense with no guarantee that the finished ramp would provide an attractive entry to the church.

The majority of parishioners in a recent survey voted to remove the ramp and return access to the Northern door to the original layout. (The original two small steps are still in place underneath the metal plates, so can easily be reinstated).

The Western Doors to the Church

Access to the church for those with mobility issues has always been available via the large Western Doors to the church. We are currently organising for these doors to have Fire Exit rails installed for ease of opening in the case of an emergency. This will also include accessibility from the outside for those who are unable to use the steps to the northern door and need to enter the church through the Western doors.

Portico at Western Entry to the Church

The Parish Council is considering building a Portico at the Western entry to the church. This would provide protection for the Western doors that would not then be subject to weather conditions, and would provide a more attractive and protected entry to the church. Initial discussions have commenced regarding possible design options and compliance with Heritage requirements.

Grandparents as Parents - High Tea

Thank you to all those who supported the recent GAPS High Tea. With the Parish Hall filled to capacity, delicate sandwiches and sumptuous cakes and slices were the order of the day. Total funds raised on the day were \$3,200 which will go a long way to ensuring the success of the annual weekend away for grandparents and children.







Bunnings BBQ

For those who enjoy a Sausage Sizzle, Bunnings was the place to be on 27th July when a team of volunteers from Saint Peter's ran the Bunnings BBQ. On a perfect sunny Winter's day the crowds poured into Bunnings and the pace at the BBQ was fast and furious throughout the day. The initial 70kg of sausages ran out by 1pm, requiring several trips to the local Woolworths to buy more during the afternoon to meet the demand.

The hard work resulted in a profit of just under \$1,500 that will go towards Saint Peter's Community Meal, allowing us to help others less fortunate.

Sincere thanks to the many volunteers who worked throughout the day - your hard work was much appreciated.



Op Shop - Surprise Visit

The Op Shop staff got a lovely surprise when a group of children from Maitland Christian School walked through the door recently - they had brought cards and gifts to say Thank You for the work that the Op Shop does to help the community

This was a touching gesture that was much appreciated by the Op Shop volunteers and at the same time demonstrated the lessons being learned by young people in recognising the work that can be done to support those less fortunate in the community.

Mission Partnerships

ABM's priorities in supporting both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglicans are to support the ministry of Indigenous Australians with their own people and communities and to support programs of training and leadership development.

The overall program has an emphasis on local leadership development rather than external leadership. ABM primarily seeks to encourage and support Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders to minister to their own people in Australia. The people and projects contribute to the development of Indigenous communities and the Australian community as a whole.

ABM fundraise for the projects by promoting them and working in partnership with the Diocese that generally manage the projects at the local level. ABM believes that Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders have a special place in this country as their ancestry goes back thousands of years. Many Indigenous Christians believe that God was with them from long ago and they find meaning and hope in the Good News of Jesus Christ. ABM believes that there is a need for trained Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Christian leaders to minister to their communities.

ABM projects are currently in New South Wales, Queensland and the Northern Territory.
