

A Message from Mother Beatrice Pate

Greetings to all, friends from our time at St Peter's in the 1980's and new friends we look forward to making.

One of the great joys of St Peter's is the love of music here. Thinking of music, and of Easter, and of the sense of returning as Dennis and I are with you for these months as I serve as your locum priest, this hymn came to mind.

Tis the gift to be simple, 'tis the gift to be free

'Tis the gift to come down where we ought to be,

And when we find ourselves in the place just right,

'Twill be in the valley of love and delight.

When true simplicity is gained,

To bow and to bend we shan't be ashamed,

To turn, turn will be our delight,

Till by turning, turning we come 'round right.'-



The beautiful words about true simplicity, and about love and delight, lead to the final line: "by turning, turning we come 'round right'". To me this is bound up in our Christian hope of heaven, and fits with this season of Easter.

But coming back to St Peter's does hold a sense of turning and return, a return after thirty-five years to where I first began in public ministry. It is going to be lovely to catch up with so many parishioners from that time, and to meet so many others who I have not yet had an opportunity to meet.

Just a short recap of our history: In 1985 I came to work at St Peters as a Lay Parish Assistant. The previous year I had completed my Bachelor of Divinity at Sydney University. As this was before, well before, women could be ordained, I was unclear how ministry would unfold, but believed in my heart that ministry was what I was called to. It was then a great opportunity when I was invited to meet Fr Greg Holmes with the view to working here as a lay assistant and a huge thing for not just me, but the whole family, as we moved from Sydney to East Maitland and I took up my position as Lay Parish Assistant.

My husband, Dennis, was able to get a transfer to work in Newcastle. He was a Senior Technical Officer in what is now Telstra. Transfers were as rare as hen's teeth, so we saw this transfer as very providential.

Our three children, Alister, Heather and Kathy (aged then from 8 to 13) also had big changes to make, to new schools, friends, connections. One of my responsibilities was the Youth Group, a large group at that time. One of the members of the group is known to you all: Bishop Sonia. Friendships our children made in that group have continued to this day.

In 1988, deaconing was now possible for women, I, along with the Rev'd Audrey Fuller was ordained Deacon. The picture shows us all outside the Cathedral on that very special day. By that time, Fr Rod Turner was Rector at St Peter's and I continued as honorary Deacon, until in 1989 I went to St Augustine's Merewether, once more to work with Fr Greg Holmes as Deacon Assistant.

So, as I did not go to Theological College, rather educated in the academic environment of Sydney Uni, what I learnt of ministry, of worship, of pastoral care, I learnt here at St Peters under the excellent examples of Fr Greg and Fr Rod, and I will always be so very grateful to what they, and you, here at St Peter's taught me.



A quick run through the remaining years, after serving at St

Augustine's for three years, Bishop Alfred sent me as Deacon in Charge to the Church of the Transfiguration at Windale. Later that year, 1992, the General Synod of Australia passed legislation to allow for the priesting of women, so that year, I and the other women deacons, were ordained priest at Christ Church Cathedral, coming after so many years, a powerful and beautiful occasion.

Following my years at the Church of the Transfiguration, I moved as Rector to St Paul's, Kurri Kurri, and then to St John's, Raymond Terrace, during most of those years serving also as Archdeacon of Maitland. I retired from St John's, when I turned 65, and retirement age in this Diocese. But then, Archbishop Roger Herft offered me a parish in Perth Diocese where the retirement age is 70, and I served my last parish appointment as Rector, for 5 years there at St Paul's, Mirrabooka.

So, this is where the hymn comes in with its motif of turning, turning! Here I am, for a few months, turning up to serve as your locum priest. As I said, my formation in ministry was here at St Peter's, and I am very much appreciative of the opportunity to be with you for this time, renewing old friendships, and making new.

And this Easter, the reminder that hymn gives that in our worship, week by week, "turning, turning," till all comes out right – and that is the promise of heaven. So, during these Easter weeks, let us worship with joy and hope and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, who promises he is with us always.



Families at the Foot of the Cross

Our Good Friday service for Families, "Families at the Foot of the Cross" has been a beautiful part of our worship for the past four years and this year was no different. Designed to be a simplified version of Stations of the Cross, we created an interactive experience of the last week of Jesus' life, so that families and children could walk in Jesus' footsteps, and understand the events of this most holy week in a more practical way. Our 'stations' included Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Trial and the Crucifixion. Between each stage we paused for prayer, and even sang songs as we moved from place to place.

An important consideration for us was to ensure that this experience would be appropriate for children, while staying true to the essential truth of what Good Friday is really all about. The most potent way we are able to do this was through the flower-cross. An important feature of each of the past three years, the



flower-cross accompanied and illuminated the idea that the cross is in many ways a sad symbol, (and that it is okay to feel sad when we think of what Jesus experienced), but that it is a symbol of joy too, as it is in the cross we see what Jesus was prepared to go through for our sake – He loved us so much that He would willingly go through this for us. Not only was it a beautiful symbol but it was a great deal of fun! Young and old had a wonderful time placing the flowers (some of them brought along from their own gardens), and creating something beautiful that could remain through the entire weekend.

This special family gathering was an incredibly vital part of our Holy Week observances. Although children are more than welcome at any of our services we feel that it is important that they have space in this week to learn in their own way, and to grow into an understanding of Christianity that we pray will stay with them as they move through life. It is important for the adults too – as we deepen our understanding of faith, it helps to come back once again to the simple, childlike faith that undergirds our beliefs, and the way we live them out in our lives.

Palm Making

In traditional Christian services Palm Sunday is used to observe the story of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. One way people have given more meaning to the palm leaf is to form it into the shape of a cross, thereby symbolising Christ's sacrifice on the cross.

Making the palm crosses in readiness for Palm Sunday is part of the tradition



of the church. Many thanks to our team of Palm Cross makers who worked hard to produce a large quantity of palm crosses that were handed out on Palm Sunday to all who attended.

Mothers' Union Visit to Christ Church Cathedral, Newcastle

On Monday 15th April a number of members and friends of Saint Peter's Mothers' Union paid a visit to Christ



Church Cathedral. On arrival we were met by The Dean, The Very Reverend Katherine Bowyer, who took us on a guided tour showing us various items of interest including the stained glass windows, Saint Michael's Chapel (also known as The Warriors' Chapel), the Tyrrell Chapel (also known as The Bishops' Chapel), and many other treasures including The Bishop's Throne (Cathedra) and also sharing the history of The Cathedral with us.

After the tour we shared morning tea with The Dean. A lovely visit enjoyed by all.

Parish Council Meetings

The Parish Council meets each month - including Church Wardens, Parish Councillors and members of the Ministry Team. Meetings cover a range of topics to ensure that all aspects of Parish life are considered and addressed in a timely fashion. Topics discussed at the April meeting included:

- . Safe Ministry Training to be scheduled for Saint Peter's a tentative date of 22nd June 2019 to be confirmed.
- . A new Heritage Consultant to be engaged to conduct work on remediation of ramp to Northern Door of the church, including handrails.
- . We have been fortunate in getting a Volunteer Grant that will cover the cost of a new Fridge and Freezer to assist with storage of food for the Community Meal.
- . A Faculty is currently being prepared to remove the rear four rows of pews from Saint Peter's Church and remediate the floor within heritage guidelines.
- . A combined 8.30 am Sunday service to be held on the 5th Sunday for months that have 5 Sundays.

Update. - Following the resignation of Beth Wood from the Parish Council and her role as Church Warden, Kevin Short has been appointed as Church Warden/Rector's Warden.

This drew a lot of attention with some new families coming along to check it out. The children had a great time and all took turns adding ingredients and filling up the patty cases. They then got to ice their cupcakes and eat them for morning tea. It was a very busy but enjoyable morning.

The play dough table continues to be a favourite for the children. They make so many things from shapes to fake food, which we have to pretend to eat. We also do art and craft projects so the children can take them home to show their family what they have done at Play Time that morning.

We have also been lucky enough to purchase new toys. These have been welcome additions as we start to replace our older and worn out toys. We have had a lot of great feedback from the children and mums.

Play Time is a busy and fun two hours. I think it is important for each parent or care giver to feel welcome and



comfortable. With this in mind, Margot Miller volunteers her time twice a month to sit with the mums and chat with them. Margot also enjoys cuddles with the babies. Alan Moir volunteers his time with the set up of the hall and this is a wonderful help as it gives me more time to set up the art and craft activities and get all of the toys out. We also have Katrina Priestly who sets up the tea and coffee every week. These volunteers are invaluable as it not only demonstrates the wonderful community of the church but these mums, dads and care givers feel welcome and relaxed when they arrive.

Mission Partnerships

Because of her, we can! was the theme of the 2018 NAIDOC week celebrations. One of the inspiring women recognised was the Reverend Gloria Shipp from Dubbo. Gloria was the first Aboriginal woman to be ordained as a Priest in the Anglican Church of Australia. She has been involved in parish ministry but felt a calling to explore new forms of culturally appropriate ministry which led to the establishment of Walkabout Ministries.



Walkabout Ministries encompasses chaplaincy at the Orana Juvenile Justice Centre in Dubbo, Women's camps, Men's camps (led by Gloria's husband, Eddie), an Elders' outreach group, Women's dinners and 'Women of the Bible' days, baptisms, an annual Christian rally, and a Reconciliation lunch.

On top of her busy local program, Gloria is also Chairperson of NATSIAC, the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Council. In 2018 Gloria joined with the North-West River Convention Circuit run by Australian Indigenous Ministries to host a Dubbo rally during Easter. Gloria took some of the men from the rally to lead a singalong and share their testimonies with the boys at Orana Juvenile Justice Centre. This connection has led to a group from Moree continuing to come once a month to share time with the boys.

In seeking assistance to continue her work, following are just a few examples of where this funding is needed:

- Women's camps cost \$1,300
- Outreach trips cost \$1,500
- The Dubbo Rally costs \$1,500
- The Reconciliation Luncheon costs \$1,600
- Women's dinners and bible studies costs \$500
- Elder's lunch and craft costs \$700
- Outreach Family Fun Day costs \$1,200
- Men's Culture weekend costs \$1,300

Memorial Service for the Hon Milton Morris AO

Saint Peter's Church was packed to capacity on 13th April for the Memorial Service for Hon Milton Morris AO. With tributes from the NSW Premier, Hon Gladys Berejiklian, CEO of Wesley Mission, Rev Dr Keith Garner, Chair of Hunter Valley Training Company, Robert Cameron AO, and family members, there was no doubting the outstanding contribution Milton Morris had made to the community both in Maitland and across NSW.

Milton Morris became the State Liberal Member for the Seat of Maitland in 1956 and retained this Seat for a record term of 24 years until 1980, being re-elected at nine consecutive elections during that time. It was during this time he became Minister for Transport for a record term of 10 years where he introduced Provisional Licences, Breathalyser, Radar Speed Cameras and established the Traffic Accident Research Unit, compulsory wearing of seat belts and banned "supercars" from public roads, as well as commencing the Eastern Suburbs Railway.

With numbers in the order of 1000 people, additional seating was provided outside the church, and in the Parish Hall where the service was streamed for those

who could not find a seat inside the church. Sophisticated audio/visual systems were in place with giant TV screens both inside the church and outside, and in the Parish Hall.

A wonderful tribute to a very special and highly regarded man. RIP Milton Morris.
