## Scott's Spot

We are approaching the end of what is one of my favourite periods in our church year. This season of time bookended by the Feasts of the Epiphany and the Transfiguration is a wonderful time of exploration and discovery and for me never fails to draw me in to a deeper understand of the true nature of Christ.

Throughout this time as we delve into the scriptures, particularly our Sunday readings, we see the gradual revealing of the identity and significance of the Christ-child of Bethlehem. In marvellous ways such as the gifting of the Magi, the thunderous voice of God at the Baptism, as well as the presence of Moses and Elijah with Jesus at the Transfiguration we come to see who this person really is.



In my own reflections in these past weeks I have been reminded that in our lives too we have the opportunity to come to a gradual deepening of our understanding of own identity and the growth and development of our Christian character. By virtue of our baptism we live in and with Christ in all of these things. The answer to the questions we often ask ourselves: who am I?; whose am I? and why am I here? can come to us as clearly as they came for Jesus himself. For that to be reality for us we need to be, like Jesus, deeply attuned and attentive to the voice of God that is within us and around us.

Yet sometimes the answers seem not to come. We hear only silence, fuzzy noise or static. A bit like the sound that comes from the television or wireless when we haven't properly tuned to a station. We all know how frustrating it can be when we are just that fraction off on the dial. In our spiritual life when we are even just that fraction off on the dial the thoughts and feelings that come can be disappointment, despondency and in extreme cases feelings of abandonment. We say things to ourselves like God has forgotten me, or God is not here.

The truth is that God is always here, and there, and over there. Wherever we are, there God is also. It is not God's presence that changes but rather our own ability to see and recognise that presence. We simply need to adjust the spiritual dial and tune in a little better.

As we set our faces toward the approaching season of Lent we are gifted with the perfect opportunity to make those adjustments on our spiritual dial and tune in a little better. Whether we need to make a large adjustment or just the smallest of changes to be more attuned to God's voice within us and around us, now is the time.

Traditionally in Lent we give things up or set things aside for the duration of the season as a way to being more aware of what is going on around us and within us. I think it is possible as well to see things differently and perhaps even consider taking things up or drawing things closer in this season. We might choose to allocate some more time in our day for prayer and reflection. We might choose to turn up at an extra service of worship that we do not usually attend. We might choose to intentionally do something for others as an act of loving service that we had not considered before. Whatever we might choose to take up in Lent shouldn't be done just to fill a void or make us even more busy, as this would defeat the purpose. Rather it might be that we do indeed need to give something up which is not working for us or is not helping us be more attuned to God's voice so that we can take on something that will help us.

I commend to you the Diocesan Lenten Study which will be released soon and is offered by the Diocesan Ministry Council as a tool for helping us to tune in more clearly and effectively this Lent. Look out for copies that will be available at the back of the church.

I pray that you have a holy Lent.

# Stained Glass Windows

The stained glass windows in the church are extraordinarily beautiful but they remain unfinished. The current yellow coloured glass high up in the clerestory windows was installed in the 1970s where once it had been hoped that stained glass would be in place.

Donors (individuals, groups, or organisations) have the opportunity to choose the memorial or thanksgiving text that will be included in the window and which will be in place for hundreds of years to come.

# Parish Meetings

### Community Ministries Apis Te Youth Group

The Apis Te Youth Group is a Christian youth group, primarily for for fellowship amongst youth (aged Year 6 – Year 11) from a number of Anglican parishes in the Newcastle Diocese, currently Beresfield-Thornton, Cessnock, East Maitland, Telarah-Rutherford, and Mount Vincent, Kurri Kurri and Weston.

The Apis Te Youth Group meets on the second and fourth Friday of each month, at alternating venues, from 6.30pm - 8.30pm. The program



regularly includes mention of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit, and other Christian concepts; use of the Bible; and worship activities – including the Eucharist (Holy Communion).

The group also participates in other activities that might include attending the drive-in movies, participating in laser skirmish, trampolining and similar activities at commercial venues, putt putt golf, ice skating, go-karts, walking, and swimming. All activities are announced beforehand and youth or their parents/carers are free to decide not to participate on any occasion.

Transport is normally the responsibility of the parents or the youth group member directly. Parents are encouraged to car pool when possible but are responsible themselves for any issues that may arise. A separate permission note will be used if, at any time, the programs organise an event which includes some other form of transport.

The expectation is that Apis Te Youth Group meetings will include dinner. If dinner is not included, the program will indicate this. Reasonable efforts will be made to accommodate food preferences and allergies.

### Saint Peter's Op Shop from Bev Steggles

On 23<sup>rd</sup> November 2019 we recalled our opening day exactly two years previously. Mayor of Maitland, Ccr Loretta Baker, performed the official opening and it was a red letter day for all the volunteers.

We had achieved the almost impossible. It was just five weeks to the day from when we had been given the go ahead to use what was then called the "Ministry Centre" for our Op Shop. The volunteers worked tirelessly and our parish family supported us all the way. We were driven and had many ups and downs in



that period. I will never forget what is now the Manchester Room, which was piled high to the ceiling with bags of clothing – far too many to count.

We were fortunate to have the support of two local tradies – Phil Marston and Ben Taylor, who set about converting the hall into a workable Op Shop. They donated their time and, on may occasions, that of their staff to assist in the renovations that were needed. Our original clothes racks more often than not would collapse and it would be all hands on deck to stand everything back up. Much team work, much laughter and plenty of innovation was called for! All done in a cheerful manner, nothing was too much trouble.

From such small beginnings we have come a long way, the hall is now well set up, including air conditioning, a small kitchenette, and a large sorting area.

We now have many customers and volunteers and have achieved recognition in our community. Our philosophy remains the same:

- 1. Providing a community service.
- 2. Raising funds for the work of our beloved Saint Peter's Church.
- 3.Reducing landfill through recycling.

As I reflect on the past two years, what stands out for me is the teamwork of the volunteers and their total commitment to our local community. The comments I have had from customers who tell me they love to come into our shop, not just to purchase goods but for the friendly, helpful volunteers that staff the shop.

I am now handing over the running of the Op Shop to Jane Hall (Elaine Taylor's daughter) and I know it will be in good hands. Jane will have an executive committee to assist her and I am certain that our Saint Peter's Op Shop will go from strength to strength. When I was first approached, Fr David asked me firstly to start the Op Shop and secondly to find someone to run it. I feel I have done as I was asked. The last two years I have been privileged to work with such a caring group of volunteers.

It would be remiss of me if I did not mention two people who have given us continued support during this time – Maryka Gibson and Richard Fellows. Their help has been boundless and much appreciated.

# Welcome to the Season of Lent

The Season of Lent in the Church is marked by preparation and repentance as we await the celebration of the death and resurrection of Christ in Holy Week and Easter. During the forty days we join Jesus in the wilderness reflecting on God's purpose and calling on our lives, and we examine ourselves in honesty before him.

In the early church the observance of Lent was for people preparing for baptism at Easter, but it soon became the practice for all Christians to join with the catechumens in a season of preparation marked by prayer, reflection, study and repentance. The outcome was spiritual growth and deeper relationships for the whole community.

This year everyone at St Peter's once again has a variety of opportunities to take time for God, to pay attention to what God is doing in their lives, and to learn and grow with others. Please join us on this spiritual journey.

### Ash Wednesday

This year the Season of Lent begins on Wednesday 26th February 2020.

Ashes have been used down through the centuries as a sign of sorrow for sin and a reminder of human mortality. Whenever Christians approach God for forgiveness they do so in the light of the saving work of Jesus and the revelation of the love and mercy of God revealed at the cross.

As ash is placed on our forehead on Ash Wednesday (the first day of Lent) we experience both an awareness of our sinfulness and fragility, and also the assurance of God's love and grace as we hear the words,

"Remember that you are but dust, and to dust you shall return."

Please join us in church as we begin our Lenten journey together:

8 am Eucharist with the Imposition of Ashes

7 pm Eucharist with the Imposition of Ashes

### Changes in the Eucharist in Lent

During Lent the liturgy at the weekend Eucharists seeks to draw us into a spirit of reflection and repentance. The penitential section of the service is moved from the beginning of worship to be after the sermon to give it greater focus. We join in singing the Trisagion, 'Holy God, Holy and Strong, Holy and Immortal, have mercy on us'.

We do not use the usual expressions of joy in worship in order to prepare ourselves for the greater joy that is to come in the Easter season. So the Gloria and use of 'Alleluia' are omitted.

We are also invited to sit and reflect in silence at the beginning of each service and following the distribution of Holy Communion.

The seasonal colour in the church is purple, to signify repentance. The Church is kept plain with the removal of flowers and some of the ornaments in the sanctuary adding to the solemn atmosphere.

When they were ready to perish, you saved your disciples: we look to you to come to our help. In the greatness of your mercy, loose us from our chains: forgive the sins of all your people. Make yourself known as our saviour and mighty deliverer:save and help us that we may praise you. Come now and dwell with us, Lord Christ Jesus: hear our prayer and be with us always. And when you come in your glory: make us to be one with you and to share the life of your kingdom.
